



Why do you feel this person deserves to be inducted in the Athletic Hall of Fame?

Anthony "Tony" D'Aurora is being nominated into the Steubenville Catholic Central Hall of Fame for his participation in Baseball.

Tony was a member of the men's basketball team for three years and lettered his senior year. He was a member of the 1970-1971 Class AA Sectional Basketball Championship and the Class AA Eastern District Basketball Championship team. During his senior year (1971-1972), he was a member of the Class AA Sectional Basketball Championship Team and the Class AA District Basketball Championship Team.

Tony also played football for the Crusaders for three years. Tony was a member of the first undefeated freshmen football team in school history (at the time) (7-0) in 1968. However, Tony's real athletic ability was on the baseball field.

Tony was a member of the Catholic Central's men's baseball team from 1969-1972. At the time, the 1972 baseball team was considered one of the greatest teams in school history. During his senior season (1972), the men's baseball team had a 17 game win streak and went 23-2 on the year. Tony went 9-1 for the year, the lone loss coming in the regional final game verse the eventual Ohio High School State Champion, Ironton (7-3). At the conclusion of his senior year, Tony was tabbed the winningest pitcher in the Ohio Valley.

Tony appeared in 12 games, throwing 48 2/3 innings. Tony gave up 49 hits on the season, 27 runs of which 14 were earned runs, 17 walks and 32 strikeouts.

When not pitching, Tony played the outfield and batted second in the lineup. During the 1972 season, Tony appeared in 26 games, and had 66 at bats. Tony was second on the team with 26 runs scored, and had 20 hits. Tony led the team in earned walks with 29, and led the team in stolen bases with 19 and sacrifice bunts with 9. Tony finished the 1972 season with a batting average of .303.

Tony was a member of the 1972 Ohio Valley Athletic Conference (OVAC) Championship Team, and was the winning pitcher of the game, beating St. Clairsville 6-4. Also during the 1972 season, the Crusaders won the Eastern District Class AA Baseball Championship, beating Philo 7-5. The Crusaders also won the Class AA Sectional Championship, beating Mingo 12-11.

At the end of Tony's senior season, he was considered the winningest pitcher in the Ohio Valley going 9-1 on the year. Tony was selected for the 1972 All Star Eastern Ohio League versus Jefferson County Game. Tony was also selected as the Utility Player for the All-Valley Baseball Team.

During Tony's junior season (1971), he went 7-0 on the season on the mound. Tony appeared in 9 games and threw 42 innings. Tony gave up 36 hits and 17 runs of which 13 were earned runs, and 21 strikeouts. Tony lead the team in stolen bases with 13 and lead the team in earned walks with 20, and lead the team in sacrifice bunts with 7. Tony appeared in 27 games at the plate, with 70 at bats, and 20 runs scored and 16 hits.

During the 1971 season, Tony was a member of the Class AA Sectional Championship Team that beat Mingo 5-1, and was a member of the Class AA Eastern District Championship Team that beat River Local 4-3. The 1971 team lost the Class AA regional first round game against Bishop Wehrle 3-1.

Tony went on to play baseball at Ohio Dominican University (ODU) where he pitched and played the outfield.

After graduating from Ohio Dominican University in 1976 with a degree in Secondary Education with a concentration in math, Tony went on to become a high school math and computer teacher. In 1976, Tony started his teaching career at St. Charles Preparatory School in Columbus, OH where he coached football, basketball, and baseball.

In 1980, Tony returned to the Ohio Valley to teach and coach at Toronto City Schools. He coached football and was the Head Baseball coach for Toronto High School. While at Toronto High School, Tony was instrumental in starting an American Legion Baseball team in Toronto (Post 668) in 1982 and coached this team one year.

Tony continued his career in 1985 at Steubenville City Schools where he coached football and was the Head Baseball Coach for Steubenville High School. Tony left the football and baseball field in 1989 but returned to coaching as the golf coach and eventually the softball coach. While at Steubenville High School, Tony coached the 1986 baseball team to the OVAC Class AAAA Championship and in 1991, Tony coached the golf team to the OVAC Class AAAA Championship. Tony coached the first two First Team All-State Softball players in school history (1999 & 2001).

In 2001Tony left teaching and coaching to become an administrator at Jefferson County Vocational School (JVS). Tony passed away in 2015 when he was the principal at the JVS.

Tony was an educator and coach his entire adult career. He coached many years for Wintersville Little League, Wintersville Girls Softball League, and the Steubenville Recreational Softball League. Tony always found the positive in his players and made sure that they not only learned the fundamentals of a sport, but that they also learned good sportsmanship and had fun while playing.

Thank you so much for considering our dad for this prestigious award. Athletics were so much a part of his life and we know this all started with the opportunities afforded to him at Catholic Central High School.







Anthony started his athletic pursuit at St. Agnes grade school where he excelled in football, basketball, and baseball. During his 8th grade year, the St. Agnes football team went 8-0 and won the parochial league championship. As the fullback he rushed for 461 yards and was awarded MVP offense. (F) He was also awarded MVP in basketball that same year. The basketball team was runner up to Holy Rosary and the baseball team runner up to Aquinas that 8th grade year. He was a key contributor on all three teams. (G)

At CCHS Anthony's athletic contribution was in 3 sports: Football, basketball, and track. He played each sport with respect for our school, the game, his teammates, and opponents. Holding himself to a high standard and never____embarrassing team or school.____

During his freshman year he led the freshman football team as the starting quarterback. He also started on the basketball team. On the freshman track team, he ran the 100, 200 and 4x100 relay.

During his sophomore year Anthony made the reserve basketball team and contributed with a considerable amount of time on the hardwood. As a sophomore on the varsity football team, he began to contribute in a meaningful way. By mid-season he was sharing quarterback responsibility with senior John Mantica. Anthony earned enough playing time as a sophomore to earn a letter in football. In addition to playing special teams, started the second half at quarterback in most games. He also started against East Liverpool (eventual State Champions). One of the highlights of the year was leading a late fourth quarter drive against Toronto in which he hit Greg Ulasiewicz on a two-point conversion to take the lead.

During his junior year he led the OVAC class in passing and was selected as the team's most valuable player. His efforts during the season were awarded with the following recognition. Anthony was selected; first team all OVAC, second team all Eastern District, and honorable mention All-Ohio.

As a senior he led the Crusaders to the first non-losing season in 5 years. Anthony was selected to OVAC, Ohio vs West Virginia annual All-Star game. Selected as a captain of the Ohio team that won 20-14 snapping a 5-game win streak for West Virginia. Anthony also scored what would be the winning touchdown of the game.

After graduation form CCHS Anthony had offers from Dartmouth, West Liberty, Waynesburg and Youngstown State to play football and further his education. He also entertained a scholarship offer from Bell & Howell Technical School. He chose to go to Youngstown State where he played football for 1 year. After Youngstown state he began his career at his career at Ohio State University. He worked at OSU for 30 years retiring as the Manager of the Heart Cauterization unit.

As Crusaders and Christians we are taught to practice our faith and to raise our children in the Church's teachings. Anthony has been married to his wife Stephanie for 21 years and they reside in Powell OH. They have raised three children; Tony, Nicole and Dominic. Tony is a junior at DePaul University in Chicago and Nicole is a sophomore at OSU. All three children have extensively participated in activities outside of the classroom in High School. 





He had a hand in all four Patriot touchdowns, throwing for three and scoring the fourth on a 13 yard run. He completed 16 of 27 passes and had 76 of his team's yards rushing which was the second best total in the patriots' 17-year history.

For the second time in three weeks, the Steelers will face a 3-

4 defense, New England was the first NFL team to go to that alignment on a full-time basis. They have the personnel to play it with outstanding linebackers and a standout nose tackle in Ray Hamilton. The Patriots broke down the great Miami offensive line and got to Dolphin quarterback Bob Griese for ove sacks while limiting the strong Miami running attack to 106 yards.

The last time the Patriots and Steelers met, Pittsburgh used the game as a springboard to their first of two straight NFL titles. That was in the 17th game of the 1974 season, a game in which Cunningham did not play and the Steeler offense could net just 69 yards passing. The 21-17 Steeler win clinched the Central Division title. From there, Pittsburgh went on to win Super Bowl IX. Chris Pashke, one of the big reasons Steubenville Central's basketball program was able to complete its rise from the outhouse to the penthouse last winter, has enrolled at Bethany College and will become a candidate for the Bison squad.

Pashke, a 6-31/2, 220-pound forward. lettered three times and helped Coach Clyde DiAngelo's Crusaders turn in an 18-7 record and gain a berth in the Ohio Class AA regional tournament at Athens — the biggest advance of any Central club in 11 years.

The Crusaders also captured the Ohio Valley Athletic Conference triple-A crown last winter - their first in five years - to top off their methodical march to success.


In the two seasons prior to Pashke's becoming a regular, Central turned in records of 1-20 and 3-17. But in the next three years, the Crusaders won 40 and dropped 29, including the banner-winning 1983-84 campaign, which ended with a 72-52 loss to eventual state runnerup seal the victory. Pashke scored 626 career points and landed 416 rebounds for the Blue and Gold, but his offensive work was only part of his total contribution.

Possessing amazing dexterity for a player his size, Pashke also dished out 91 assists last winter and helped spread out the wealth for DiAngelo's club - which prided itself on breaking the press and hitting the open

His ball-handling and passing skills rivalled many of the area's point guards. Pashke finished the season with 283 points in 25 starts, an average of 11.3 points per game.

He saved perhaps his best performance for the Crusaders' 57-54 double-A district championship victory over Morgan at St. John Arena in Steubenville. He scored six points in Ohio's 79-77 victory in the boys' AAAA-AAA contest at the OVAC All-Star Basketball Classic held two weeks ago at the Wheeling College Fieldhouse.

As a junior, Pashke averaged 13.2 points per game and hit for a career high of 28 points in a sectional loss to Steubenville. He also tallied 66 points in 19 appearances as a sophomore.

Pashke chose Bethany over an offer from Findlay College.


